<u>Janet Ekstrum</u> has been a District Wildlife Biologist for the Rapid River/Manistique District, Hiawatha National Forest for the past 19 years. She specializes in habitat enhancement and protection of rare and listed wildlife species with an emphasis on pollinators, Kirtland's warbler and Great Lakes Piping Plover. She co-authored the Monarch Butterfly Conservation Strategy for the Eastern Region of the Forest Service and has conducted native bee surveys for the past three years on the West Zone of the Hiawatha NF. Janet received a Bachelor of Science in Zoology from Ohio University and Wildlife and Fisheries Management Certificates from Hocking College. She has worked on all three Michigan National Forests and the White River NF in Colorado.

<u>Ana Heck</u> joined Michigan State University in January 2019 as a Research Technologist to support pollinator education initiatives, honey bee research, and implementation of policies to protect pollinators. Heck learned how to keep bees in Nicaragua while apprenticing on a teaching farm and working with a women's beekeeping cooperative from 2011 through 2013. She began working with the University of Minnesota Bee Squad in 2014, where she managed apiaries, provided hands-on and classroom training to beekeepers, and managed Bee Squad outreach and Extension programs. Heck holds a B.A. in Philosophy and Spanish from Creighton University and a Master's degree in Public Policy from the University of Minnesota.

<u>Dr. Adam Ingrao</u> is the Veteran's Liaison for Michigan State University Extension and an Agricultural Entomologist. He holds a BS in Agriculture and Environmental Plant Science from California Polytechnic State University, a PhD in Entomology from Michigan State University, and is a former National Science Foundation Fellow. His expertise is in beneficial insects in agroecosystems and he is nationally recognized for his beekeeping education program for military veterans called Heroes to Hives. He and his wife also own and operate Bee Wise Farms LLC.

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Kevin and Lauri LaBumbard started keeping bees in 2012. They have kept between two and seven hives (depending how many swarm and how many are captured!) in any given summer. Their bee yard is in Skandia, MI, in the center of the Upper Peninsula. Both recently retired (foresters), they hope to expand their apiary slightly, and possibly start a second bee yard at Kevin's camp near Rapid River. They have learned a lot from other beekeepers in the Superior Beekeeping Club and continue to learn from their bees each summer.

<u>Michelle Landis</u> has a bachelor's degree in criminal justice and used to work with adjudicated, abused, and neglected youth. She has been interested in homestead-type activities for a number of years. She cooks most of her family's meals from scratch, making use of products from their garden, ducks, and bees. Honey is mighty nice, but the rewards of keeping bees don't stop there. Michelle enjoys making many homemade items from the products of the hive, such as honey, wax, and propolis.

Michelle has kept bees for about seven years and has been the "Bee Gal" for the Superior Beekeeping Club for almost as long. She currently serves as President for the club and looks forward to seeing the club expand and be able to offer many educational opportunities in the future.

<u>Dr. Meghan Milbrath</u> began working bees with her father as a child over 20 years ago, and now owns and manages The Sand Hill Apiary, a small livestock and queen rearing operation in Munith, Michigan. She studied biology at St. Olaf College in Northfield, MN, and received degrees in public health from Tulane University and the University of Michigan, where she focused on environmental health sciences and disease transmission risk. Meghan worked as a postdoctoral research associate under Zachary Huang at Michigan State University, studying nosema disease, and is currently an academic specialist at MSU, where she does honey bee and pollinator research and extension and is the coordinator of the Michigan Pollinator Initiative.

Meghan is active in multiple beekeeping organizations, writes for multiple beekeeping journals, and speaks about bees all over the country. She currently runs the Northern Bee Network, a directory and resource site dedicated to supporting queen producers, and she is passionate about keeping and promoting healthy bees.

He has taught courses on raising queens using the Nicot method, Beekeeping 201 (Dare to Manage Your Bees), mite management, and swarm catching. For several years, Susan and Dave were the "Bee Busters", catching swarms in the Marquette area. David currently keeps 17 +/- hives in North Dickinson County behind a nasty electric bear fence. Susan has 3 hives in Marquette Township.

<u>Tom Nebel</u> has been an active beekeeper for over 40 years. What he doesn't know about bees probably is not worth knowing. He continues to practice his art and has been generous in mentoring beekeepers, new and "old". Tom currently has about 30 hives – down from his peak of over 300.

<u>Dave Wiitanen</u> is a long-time beekeeper and president of the Copper Country Beekeepers Club. Dave keeps more than 100 hives and sells his honey around the Upper Peninsula.
